31. a) Letter from Hans Wolf to a friend.

In the Trenches, 26 December 1914

My Dearest Friend,

You will not believe what I witnessed yesterday, on Christmas Day. It was a miracle, a moment of pure magic in the midst of this terrible war.

It began on Christmas Eve, with the English soldiers singing carols. We responded with our own. Then, yesterday morning, on Christmas Day, a soldier from our side waved a white flag and walked into No Man's Land, calling out "Happy Christmas!"

To my astonishment, the British soldiers did not shoot. They came out to meet us. There we were, two armies who were enemies, standing together, shaking hands, and sharing our rations. I, an officer from Dusseldorf, shared schnapps and sausage with a British officer from Dorset. We talked about our families, our homes... we even played a game of football!

For that one day, there was no war. We were just men, sharing peace and goodwill. It makes me wonder if this whole conflict is madness. If we can find so much in common in the middle of a battlefield, why are we fighting?

It was the best Christmas present I have ever had.

32. b) Paragraph on Tsunami Safety Steps.

During a natural disaster like a tsunami, taking immediate safety steps is crucial for survival. The most important rule is to move inland and to higher ground immediately, especially if you are in a low-lying coastal area. Do not wait for an official warning if you feel a strong earthquake, as this itself is the natural warning for a tsunami. If you hear an official tsunami warning, evacuate at once. Follow designated evacuation routes and do not stop to gather belongings; your life is more important. Stay away from beaches, rivers, and estuaries, as the waves will travel up these channels. Do not return to the coast after the first wave, as tsunamis often consist of multiple, dangerous waves that can arrive hours apart.

33. b) Paragraph based on the Bar Chart.

The provided bar chart displays the number of watches produced by five different watch companies. The vertical axis represents the number of watches, while the horizontal axis lists the company names: Rolex, Titan, Casio, Fossil, and Seiko. According to the chart, Titan is the company with the highest production, manufacturing 60 watches. Rolex follows, with 45 watches produced. Seiko is the third-highest producer, with 40 watches. Casio produced 35 watches. The company with the lowest production among the group is Fossil, which manufactured only 25 watches. The chart clearly shows a significant variation in production numbers across the five companies.
